

## **Pathmakers**

## A journey from isolation to participation

Pathmakers is one of the core programmes of Patang supported by New Delhi based National Foundation for India. This is a year-long youth development programme aiming to enhance critical thinking and establish youth as responsible citizens. Meant for college going students aged between 18 and 25, this is a volunteering programme that strives to create an alternative learning process to develop the students' understanding about social and economical issues, recognise their potential and hone their skills so that they take decisions on their own through experiencing the transformational journey.

#### **Highlights**

- 01-1,100 youth going through the extensive journey

- 17 youths trained on video journalism and prepared video to address gender, violence and environment issues

## Case Study

Nirmal Sahu, 20, lives with his parents and younger brother in G. Badmal village of Sambalpur district. He does not have a sister. Nirmal has seen his mother doing all household chores and heard everybody saying that cooking, washing clothes and sweeping the floor are jobs not meant for boys, who should play football and cricket in the playground, and pick up heavy materials when they grow up. Even after he grew up, he was not aware of issues relating to women as he did not have any contact with girls of his age. Then, his brother, who is a volunteer of Patang, introduced him to the youth organisation. He was selected as a youth facilitator in Gender and SRHR project.



After undergoing the three-day life-skill and four-day project finalisation trainings, Nirmal started attending different activities organised by Patang such as ASER healthy survey, SDGs campaign, water consultation and monthly review meetings. He came to know about the Gender and SRHR concept from life-skill and issue based trainings. As Nirmal involved himself in the activities, he got a chance to interact with girl volunteers and his understanding about gender and women's issues became better. He realised that he should share the work burden of his mother at home. He cooked food, swept the floor and washed the clothes of family members so that his mother got some time off to relax.

Nirmal formed a youth group with 35 young boys and girls of his village and facilitated life-skills and gender sessions with them. He also met different community people and stakeholders with a view to sharing and also engaging with them about the benefits of the project. Nirmal sensitises and spreads message on gender through foot marches, poster exhibitions, storytelling and poetry competitions, and street plays. Now he is actively working in this project and taking initiatives towards gender SRHR.

## Goal pe Bol Campaign

While working with young people, it is important to make them realise the importance of their contribution in sharing their collective voice to address many issues on different platforms. This year, a campaign on Sustainable Development Goal was organised and conducted in 11 states of India. Patang led the campaign in Odisha.

The campaign was mainly led by youths and students who addressing a range of issues on quality of education and gender equality in educational institutions across various levels in society. The campaign involved youth and intellectuals during the whole process. Various unconventional activities such as film screening, theatre, small group discussions were held in rural areas. During the process, 12 youth were selected to represent Odisha at the national level conference in New Delhi. They participated in various activities and addressed social issues of our region through various means during the national level campaign.

A district level programme on SDG was organsied where young people presented their manifesto to local representatives of the legislative assembly.

## Engaging Young boys to address Gender and SRHR issues in community

This programme supported by Stichting Kinderpostzegels, Netherland (SKN) focuses on strengthening young boys on challenges related to stereotyped gender inequality and SRHR (sexual and reproductive health and rights). The main objectives of the programme is to create peer facilitators in community through building their capacities on Gender and SRHR by providing knowledge, information, exposure, physical activities, workshops and intellectual discussions. Using sports as a medium, we are trying to involve dropout boys, who form a sizable number of rural youth force. Currently there are 20 youth volunteers who are working as peer facilitators in their community with 140 young girls and 227 young boys in 10 villages.

The Youth Facilitation Centre has a major role in developing issue based understanding and knowledge on gender, SRHR and among the young people. It facilitates different meetings, activities, film screenings and interaction with experts to create more awareness on the issues with diverse stakeholders.

## Case Study On Change

Tipupada is a small tribal populated locality under the Sambalpur municipality. Most of the adolescents of this locality were engaged in daily wage labour activities alongside studying in schools and colleges. Kiran Khadia, a young adolescent boy living with his family in the area, is doing his training in ITI as well as helping his father in daily labour activities. Prior to his involvement in this programme, he had a discriminating mindset towards the role of women in society. He thought that girls were meant to do household chores and to play less physical, indoor games. He thought that boys were superior and meant to do outdoor physical activities and play outdoor games. He did not allow his own sister to play outside along with the boys. However, attending meetings and sessions done by Patang changed his mindset completely.



After being selected as a youth facilitator, he attended project designing workshop. He himself designed an eight-month project keeping in mind the gender inequality issues of his area. After completion of the training, he took many initiatives one of which was formation of a football team consisting of both boys and girls. His sister is one of the team members. His team encourages girls to play and work along with boys to reduce the gender gap in society. He also facilitates life-skill, Gender and SRHR sessions with his team members so that they can take this vision to as many youths as possible at the ground level.

# Capacity Building Of Adolescents On Gender And SRHR In Schools

Building life-skills among school children is one of the most important parts of our work. This year the Desi Bihana Suraksha Mancha of western Odisha invited Patang as a resource agency to facilitate Gender and SRHR curriculum in schools of Sambalpur and Bargarh districts. The main objective of the workshops was to make the students realise the importance of food, organic farming, labour and gender issues in farming, and to help them link it up to learn and practise organic kitchen gardens in the school premises. We have been working with 800 students of 10 schools of three districts in Odisha.

We have been working on gender issues from the very beginning in our respective areas. Through different innovative programmes, we have reached out to many young people in the region. We have been facilitating the One Billion Rising Campaign since last two years with Jagori organsation as our partner. This was a great platform for us to create more awareness on gender issues among maximum number of people through the campaign. This year we have focused on gender issues, especially women rights and constitutional rights.

## **Child Rights and Education**

## Mother Tongue based Multi Lingual Education

This is a project supported by Wipro for improving learning outcome of children especially in language at elementary level through mother tongue based Multi Lingual Education and advocating with the government to ensure teaching using mother tongue at primary level. The project also focuses on giving capacity building programmes to teachers and team members for developing various innovative Teaching-cum-Learning Materials (TLMs) in Sambalpuri language (local mother tongue of the region).

in Meghpal Upper Primary School. I was not interested to study in classroom before. I was an introvert kind of student. When I attended the sessions and activities facilitated by Patang team members, I found the learning in different ways. We started playing, singing, story-telling, drawing and acting, which certainly created in me the interest to read and write the things more easily. I was more confident after doing the storytelling activities in my classroom. I could open up with my teachers. After attending these classes, I could easily know the topics related to language, environment, maths by using different TLMs. Now I can easily solve the math addition, subtraction, multiplication, ascending and descending numbers. I can make word formation, sentence making, spellings and detailing by seeing pictures in language subjects.

## Vidyautkarsh

This is a programme supported by ACC Limited, where we involved children through innovative joyful learning methodologies, participatory approach and child centric activities. We are running a space called Children Learning Centre where students, both school going and dropouts participate, present their thoughts and learn through innovative ways. We have tried to teach children in a play-way method by creating student-friendly environment in the classroom.



The project also involves capacity building of teachers so that they can implement it in the schools so as to benefit a wide range of students. Also to sensitise the community people and link them with school education, we have interacted with and involved them in different events such as Sishu Prativa Mohotshov, Math Mela, Bahi Hata (book fair) so as to increase the leadership qualities and confidence level among the students.

## Livelihood And Entrepreneurship

## Creating young Entrepreneur through sustainable livelihood opportunities

This programme, supported by the National Foundation for India, has been developed to strengthen and enhance entrepreneurship skills among the young generation to explore sustainable livelihood opportunity in own community and combat the migration of young people from villages. Capacity building of the young people is provided by technical and financial aids from Patang to establish small scale ntrepreneurship in their villages. We promoted the programme in Sambalpur, Bargarh and Boudh, during which 14 selected people received financial support to start of their businesses.

Continuous exposure and trainings are organsied to develop their entrepreneurship skills. As most of the target groups are from farming background, a five-day workshop was conducted on agro-ecological farming with 40 participants from the three districts. Noted agriculture scientist Debal Deb focused on the problems of farmers and spoke to them about various ill-effects of present day agro procedures and ways to make them self-dependent in all aspects. He also addressed the issues of agro-economical farming - a type of organic farming, which involves economic diversity using zero external input in their natural habitat. He stressed on using indigenous seeds, organic fertilisers and compost, and traditional irrigation systems. He also taught them about seed storage procedures and various processes to check pests infecting the harvest. We have also involved women from self-help groups (SHGs) who undertake agricultural activities for income generation.









## Story of a young woman entrepreneur

Kalastika, a young woman from Chhamunda village of Sambalpur, lives alone as her parents are in Ranchi in Jharkhand. She has a dream to become self-sufficient and self-reliant. Before coming in contact with Patang, she was working as a caretaker in a nearby school cum care home. As her wage was quite low, she decided to set up a small stationary shop in the village. However, she did not have much funds to cater to the demands of customers and was unable to expand her shop. In 2018, she came to know about the entrepreneurship support given by Patang. After getting support from us, she was able to buy a variety of products according to the customers' need and demand.

Now, her earnings have increased. Leena, another young woman of the village, has become her business partner. They divide the profit between themselves besides saving some money for future and to repay the installments. People of the village appreciate her for the hard work that she has done to establish herself as a young woman entrepreneur. She has become an example for many young women not only in her village but also surrounding areas.





## YOUTH AND GOVERNANCE





## **Youth And Governance**

#### Juba Sathi

This programme is aiming to strengthen young people to take up leadership and address the rights and entitlement issues of their community. Patang has partnered with the district administration and ActionAid to encourage young people to participate in the process of governance.

We have been collectivising informal and unorganised workers to access the benefits from different programme and schemes. After following up with district administration, they could demand their rights and have access to them. Through the initiative, they got land pattas and 80 households are now doing organic farming in their lands with seven varieties of paddy crops. They are following local practices for farming and preparing the organic medicines and manure. The nearby villages are also interested in organic farming. One of the most important objectives of the programme was to encourage the community to grow organic food for their own needs to remain healthy and also preserve the indigenous seeds.

Keeping this idea in mind, a regional level convention was organised on December 14, 2018 at the Catholic Church in Sambalpur. Nearly 300 unorganised workers from four districts – Sambalpur, Bargarh,

Jharsuguda and Sonepur – participated in the convention and discussed their issues. They finally presented a manifesto on their issues and challenges to Rairakhol MLA Rohit Pujari who has responded positively and assured to raise it in the assembly. Lack of leadership and mutual coordination among various workers' group is a major reason for their own exploitation. Taking this issue into consideration, our team organised a gathering of all unorganised workers' groups. It stressed on improving leadership quality, team spirit and confidence among the members, which helped them to raise their voice against all types of exploitations.
